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PURPOSE AND SCOPE OF THE PROJECT

The SUNY Undergraduate Alumni Outcomes (SUNY AOS) Project

SUNY System Administration led the system's institutions in a cooperative research effort to develop and implement an assessment of institutions' alumni. This instrument, the SUNY Undergraduate Alumni Outcomes Survey (SUNY AOS), was designed to assist institutional staff with assessing college performance evaluation, as well as offer individual SUNY institutions valuable information on alumni perceptions to help shape and guide their efforts to enhance academic programs and support services for all students.

At each participating institution, a local campus coordinator was responsible for providing 1991 and 1994 alumni names and mailing information to ACT. ACT coordinated and administered the survey to over 99,800 alumni from 59 participating institutions. ACT prepared detailed summary reports, subgroup reports for various respondent subgroups, composite reports, institutional summary reports, and an executive summary.

The survey instrument. 1998-99 was the inaugural year for this survey project. Modeled on ACT's *Alumni Outcomes Survey*, the SUNY AOS was modified based on input from SUNY institutions, SUNY System Administration staff, and ACT staff.

The SUNY AOS is a four-page, op-scan survey form designed to assess alumni opinions on a variety of subjects. The nine sections in the SUNY AOS and the items they contain are as follows.

Section I-Background Information contains 17 items that primarily deal with demographic and background data. Items in this section include Social Security number; birth year; racial/ethnic group; employment/educational status; gender, degrees earned; largest, total student loan debt; highest lifetime educational goal; and overall college GPA at graduation.

Section II-Undergraduate Educational Experiences contains items that ask alumni to evaluate their experiences at the college while they were in attendance. The primary parts of this section contain items assessing alumni satisfaction with academic quality, curricula, facilities, campus climate, support services, faculty relations, and cost. Other items in the section concern issues such as overall rating of college experience and likelihood of recommending the institution to friends.

Section III-Undergraduate Educational Outcomes contains one set of 26 items. For each of the items, alumni are first asked to indicate the importance of a particular competency or skill in their current endeavors and then to indicate the contribution of their college experiences to their development in each area.

Section IV-Employment History and Experiences contains two parts, each of which comprises several items or a set of items. Part 1 contains questions asking specific information about current alumni employment and their level of satisfaction with 18 aspects of their current job. Part 2 contains questions asking information about the first job alumni held after completing their college degree.

Section V-Activities and Organizations contains ten activities and organizations for which alumni are asked to indicate their level of involvement during college and at the present time.

Section VI-Mailing Addresses is an area in which alumni are asked to provide their current home and business addresses and telephone numbers.

Section VII-Alumni Activities contains four items asking for information about how frequently alumni visit the college, their level of activity in alumni affairs, and whether they would like to receive more information about their college's alumni activities.

Section VIII-Additional Questions provides an opportunity for institutions to ask up to 30 locally developed questions. Of the 59 participating colleges, 29 provided additional questions to which their alumni were to respond.

Section IX-Comments and Suggestions provides an area in which alumni can write comments, suggestions, or other thoughts they might choose to share with the institution.

Number of alumni that participated in the 1998-99 SUNY AOS project

Table B1 (Appendix B) contains a listing of the 4-year state-operated SUNY institutions that participated in this project, the total number of alumni surveyed (sample size), the number of completed surveys, and each institution's response rate; Table B2 (Appendix B) contains the same data for the SUNY community colleges. Tables B3 and B4 (Appendix B) contain the same information as Tables B1 and B2, respectively, but at the 1991 and 1994 alumni-year level. ACT administered the surveys through standard U.S.P.S. mail.

The 29 participating 4-year state-operated colleges asked a total of 55,105 alumni to complete the survey; and 11,658 (23 percent) alumni responded. The 30 participating community colleges asked 44,789 alumni to complete the survey; 8,024 (21 percent) responded. Response rates were computed adjusting for undeliverable mail.

Reports provided to your institution

Following the processing of your institution's completed survey instruments in June, 1999, a summary report containing frequencies and percentages of your alumni's responses to all items was sent to your campus coordinator. The summary report also presented Likert scale items in rank order by average, with standard deviations, from highest to lowest and in item number order. In addition to the summary report, 5 subgroup reports were sent to your

campus survey coordinator. The subgroup reports contained basic descriptive statistics (frequencies, percentages, means, and standard deviations) of your alumni's responses to all survey items and for the responses from 74 alumni subgroups. SUNY System Administration selected the subgroups for which these reports were generated.

This *Institutional Summary Report* supplements the other two reports. It contains answers to some basic questions about the project, cautions to consider when interpreting the results, highlights of your institution's survey results, and statistical comparisons of your institution's results with those of similar types of institutions (e.g., community colleges, university centers). This report includes the following sections.

- 1. A narrative summary of highlights of your institution's survey results, including those for programs, services, and characteristics.
- 2. Comparative statistical information (Appendix A). This section contains your institution's item-by-item results ranked in relation to those of your sister institutions. Significance test information is also included to aid in the interpretation of differences between your results and those of other SUNY institutions.
- 3. Tables containing system-wide survey results (Appendix B). Information included in these tables is number of surveys mailed to 1991 and 1994 alumni, number of completed surveys ACT received, response rates, survey administration information, demographic data, and item level data.
- 4. **Graphics Report (Appendix C).** Graphical representations of selected demographic items and, for Section II, III, and IV items, the highest five and lowest five satisfaction averages.

To assist the campus coordinator, ACT is also providing additional composite data detailing SUNY system-wide statistics and item-by-item summary data for the combined responses of alumni from seven groups of SUNY institutions outlined below.

- ♦ 59 participating SUNY institutions
 - ♦ 30 participating community colleges
 - ♦ 29 participating state-operated colleges
 - ♦ 5 colleges of technology
 - ♦ 7 specialized colleges
 - ♦ 4 university centers
 - ♦ 13 university colleges

INTERPRETING YOUR INSTITUTION'S RESULTS

Factors to consider when interpreting results

Before comparing and contrasting your institution's results with those of various comparison groups, you should consider the following information and cautions.

Sampling factors. Were your response rates similar to those of the groups with which you plan to compare your results? If not, the rating, satisfaction, and agreement average differences you observe may be due to differences in your sampling.

Respondents' demographic characteristics. Are the demographic and background characteristics of the comparison groups sufficiently similar to those of your institution's respondents? Large demographic differences may raise questions concerning any comparisons. For example, if your respondents included mostly five-year alumni while most other campuses equally sampled from five-year and eight-year alumni classes, you may need to interpret all of your inter-institutional comparisons with special caution.

Comparison groups. The comparative data provided for the various SUNY institutional groups are based on simple composites of the survey records obtained independently by each of the participating institutions. The averages were weighted to adjust for institutional and sample size.

Additional factors to consider

Absolute interpretations. The absolute magnitude of all averages should be considered when interpreting the comparative figures. For example, if your institution's satisfaction average for a particular item was 4.00 (on a 5-point scale) and the comparable SUNY institution type average was 4.20, your average, although slightly lower, indicates a fairly high degree of satisfaction. Also, consideration of the percentages of alumni selecting each of the response options can provide valuable information that might be missed using only the item average.

Tests of significance. The test of significance (a two-tailed test) for each difference was based on a two-sample contrast between your institution's satisfaction or agreement average and the corresponding average for other institutions in your SUNY comparison group. The test assumed that both samples were randomly selected from their parent populations and that the variability of responses (coded 5, 4, 3, 2, and 1) for the colleges involved in the comparison were roughly the same. Note that this test addresses neither the practical significance nor the appropriateness of the comparison being made. An observed difference can be statistically significant but not really important to you; similarly, other results can be important to you when they are not statistically significant.

Significance levels. Three different significance levels (.05, .001, and .00001) were used in conducting the statistical tests presented in your institution's comparative report. Because of the large number of statistical tests conducted, you may wish to exercise caution when interpreting differences that are statistically significant only at the .05 level. Even if the null hypotheses were all true (i.e., there were no statistically significant differences), you would expect to observe several Type I errors when conducting this many significance tests at the .05 level.

SELECTED HIGHLIGHTS OF YOUR INSTITUTION'S SURVEY RESULTS

A brief summary of your institution's 1999 SUNY AOS survey results is presented in this section. Keeping in mind the cautions and considerations that were previously mentioned, the following observations may be of particular interest to your institution.

Response Rates and Administration Modes

The response rate for the Suffolk Community College survey (16%) was low compared to the average for other SUNY community colleges (21%). The number of survey forms processed for your institution (399) was adequate (assuming no systematic bias) to provide population estimates based on the sample data (see Tables B2 and B4, Appendix B).

Comparisons of Demographic Characteristics

The respondents from your institution were similar to other SUNY community colleges in all demographic characteristics.

See Table B6 in Appendix B for a comparison of all demographic items.

Comparisons of Rating/Agreement/Satisfaction Averages

In general, your respondents' satisfaction/agreement averages were similar to those of respondents from the other SUNY community colleges for many items. However, in some cases your respondents had higher averages, and in other cases your respondents had lower averages. The cases in which your respondents' averages differed from the averages of respondents from the other SUNY community colleges are highlighted below.

Comparisons of Ratings of Educational Experiences (Section II-Part A)

Suffolk Community College respondents were similar to other SUNY community college respondents on items in this section.

Comparisons of Agreement Averages for Educational Experiences (Section II-Part B)

Relative to respondents from other SUNY community colleges, Suffolk Community College respondents had lower agreement averages and ranked in the bottom three for:

- there was a sense of personal safety/security on the campus (3.61vs. 3.88), and
- I developed strong friendships with other students while at this college (3.32 vs. 3.57).

Overall Certainty of Undergraduate Choices (Section II-Parts C & D)

Suffolk Community College respondents had certainty averages similar to other SUNY community colleges.

Comparisons of Satisfaction Averages for Aspects, Services, or Programs (Section II-Part F)

Relative to respondents from the other SUNY community colleges, Suffolk Community College respondents had lower satisfaction averages and ranked among the bottom five for:

- quality of academic advising (3.36 vs. 3.57),
- general condition of buildings and grounds (3.70 vs. 4.01),
- library services and materials (3.78 vs. 3.99), and
- academic support services (3.53 vs. 3.74).

Comparisons of Importance in Current Endeavor Ratings (Section III)

Relative to respondents from the other SUNY community colleges, Suffolk Community College respondents had a higher importance rating and ranked fourth for:

• appreciating literature and the fine arts (3.34 vs. 3.12).

Comparisons of Contribution of College Experience Ratings for Educational Outcomes (Section III)

Suffolk Community College respondents had contribution ratings similar to other SUNY community colleges.

Comparisons of Employment Satisfaction Averages (Section IV)

Suffolk Community College respondents had average ratings similar to other SUNY community college respondents in this section. See Table A7 in Appendix A for details.

Comparisons of Employment Experience (Section IV)

See Table A7 in Appendix A for the comparisons of items for this section. Suffolk Community College respondents had similar averages to those of other participating community colleges on most items in this section. However, your alumni's average on "How well did your undergraduate experiences at this college prepare you for your current job?" was lower than other community college respondents (4.06 vs. 4.26). See Table A7 in Appendix A for details.

Comparisons of Activities and Organizations (Section V)

See Tables A8 and A9 in Appendix A for the comparison of all items addressing involvement in activities and organizations while attending college (Table A8) and at the current time (Table A9).

Comparisons of Alumni Activities (Section VII)

Table A10 in Appendix A contains alumni agreement ratings regarding the adequacy of the information they receive on alumni events and services at Suffolk Community College.

Summary

Overall, Suffolk Community College respondents' ratings of college facilities, college programs, health issues, faculty issues, course availability/content, special opportunities, and student activities tended to be similar to those from other community colleges. The ratings of Suffolk Community College alumni were lower than other community colleges for campus climate and academic support services. However, your respondents' rating of fine arts appreciation was higher than those of other community college alumni. Also, note that your respondents' rating of "Overall, how would you rate this college (for the time during which you were attending it as an undergraduate)?" was lower than other community college respondents and ranked 23 among the 30 participating community colleges (Table A3 in Appendix A).

Keep in mind that any of the observed differences could be due, at least in part, to variations in response rates, demographic characteristics of your respondents, and availability of programs and services. Additionally, although many of the differences indicated were statistically significant, the magnitude of many of the differences was quite small. This would suggest that some of these differences may not be of *practical* significance. Therefore, small mean differences (less than \pm .2) or those that are significant at the p < .05 level should be interpreted with caution.



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


Figure 1. Section I - Background Information, Item C: Age




Figure 2. Section I - Background Information, Item C: Racial / Ethnic




Figure 3. Section I - Background Information, Item D: Gender




Figure 4. Section I - Background Information, Item E: Primary Work Status




Figure 5. Section I - Background Information, Item K: Largest Undergrad Student Loan Debt




Figure 6. Section II - Undergraduate Educational Experiences, B: Agreement with Statements about this College




Figure 7. Section II - Undergraduate Educational Experiences, D: How would you rate this college?




Figure 8. Section II - Undergraduate Educational Experiences: Satisfaction with Aspects, Services, or Programs of this College




Figure 9. Section II - Undergraduate Educational Experiences: Satisfaction with Aspects, Services, or Programs




Figure 10. Section III - Undergraduate Educational Outcomes: Importance in Current Endeavors




Figure 11. Section III - Undergraduate Educational Outcomes: Importance in Current Endeavors




Figure 12. Section III - Undergraduate Educational Outcomes: Contribution of Undergraduate College Experiences




Figure 13. Section III - Undergraduate Educational Outcomes: Contribution of Undergraduate Experiences




Figure 14. Section IV - Employment History, C: Annual Income from Current Job




Figure 15. Section IV - Employment History, Item E: Satisfaction with Aspects of Current Job




Figure 16. Section IV - Employment History, Item E: Satisfaction with Aspects of Current Job Largest Positive and Largest Negative Differences between Your Institution's Averages and the Community Colleges' Averages
